

A year ago as I was in Spirit Lake at the **Volunteers in Mission United Methodist Ministry Center** in North Dakota, I wrote to you for the first time, anticipating our meeting mid-August. It's hard to believe that nearly a year has passed and that I am headed to Spirit Lake this very night with a team from Broadway.

What a year's journey this has been for us as pastor and people, as we have learned to know one another and build our trust with each other.

You may not know that about twenty months ago, as I faced a spiritual crisis, I returned again to the first profound sense of call I had that led me into the path to ordination. It was a call to *heal homophobia* — sounds huge, doesn't it? It felt that way to me then and it still feels like an enormous undertaking...and yet, here at Broadway, I experience the fullness of God's inclusive love in the way that I believe the Gospel calls us to live it. On my first Sunday here, I expressed to many of you that I felt I had come "home" — back in the city, back in a reconciling congregation, back in a multi-cultural setting.

Thanks for this first year together.

I am filled with gratitude at the way our lives have touched one another and the ways that we are listening for God's leading into the future. I am deeply moved when I see how you place your lives before God, and I am grateful that we are seeking to transform the world together — a little bit at a time, beginning in the neighborhood, moving out to a Reservation in North Dakota, and...who knows what God will lead us to next?

## Vernice's View

### Ministry Beyond Broadway

So many folks ask about mission opportunities and I have to be honest, I have some anxiety when I hear that question because of the history of mission work. If we are truthful we will admit that some real damage has been done to “others” in the name of charity and Christian works. Yet there is so much need in our world and we are called, as people of faith, to feed the hungry and clothe the naked.

What I am celebrating is the intentional study of how and why to do outreach. In one of our recent classes facilitated by Amy Daigler and Aaron Anderson, we studied the book *Take This Bread* by Sara Miles. It challenged us to ask questions like: what is our real motivation for mission? Are we doing the work to check something off our list of good deeds or to make a difference in the world? What gifts are we bringing? Are we equipped to be with the people we are serving? Is it advantageous to go to their space or for them to come to ours? And why? It was a powerful study, often uncomfortable as we talked about our own prejudices and blind spots, and how to be aware of them as we reach out beyond our immediate community. As a result of that study I believe many of us can now do outreach with different eyes, ears and hearts.

Recently, I was a part of a group that went to Lakeview Shelter to cook and serve food for the residents. This was my second time serving in this way. The first was a few months ago with the confirmation class. Both experiences were inspirational. It was amazing to process the experience through the eyes of two teenagers, same age, different gender and ethnicity. Though they came with different perspectives, some of their conclusions were the same. They both recognized it was about the people they were serving, not about themselves. They took the time to engage and interact. Without judgment, we sat and ate with the residents and had conversation. Just like we do at our own dinner tables, imagine that.

We have an opportunity to extend our ministry of radical hospitality in this way, on the first and third Mondays of each month (see article on page 5). We are responsible to bring food, cook, and serve and to just be with the residents — offering our resources but offering ourselves as well. I find that to be the simplest and yet the most difficult part of outreach. Can we treat the people we serve like family, like they are an essential part of our life journey? We give, but are we open to receive? Are we able to believe that everyone has something to offer which can inform and shape our understanding as we move together through life? Those questions and answers are critical to the work of mission.

## AUGUST MISSION MINUTE

### Spirit Lake Dakota Nation

Last month, BUMC sent our stalwart mission workers to Spirit Lake to do service. This month is our opportunity to give Spirit Lake our financial support.

The peoples of the Spirit Lake Nation are of the Dakota Tribe and have been in their area since 1867. The reservation is located in one of the most beautiful parts of the Dakotas just 8 miles south of Devils Lake, North Dakota. The reservation consists of four districts on one half million acres spread across rolling prairie and wooded hills. The Spirit Lake Ministry Center is located on 80 acres in the Wood Lake District just 3 miles from Tokio, North Dakota. The Ministry Center has 3 dormitories, an up-to-date shower/toilet facility, a work shop, a kitchen/dining facility and a Chapel. There are 3 separate devotional areas and a large fire pit available for the use of our teams.

The Spirit Lake Ministry Center hosts volunteer teams from all over the country. These Volunteer in Mission (VIM) Teams will be asked to perform light construction and maintenance on homes, Tribal buildings and grounds on the reservation and to provide team members for children's activities. All activities are very hands on and involve close interaction with the elders and children of the reservation. Each VIM team will also be provided opportunities for work projects on the Ministry Center. Opportunities for participation in Native American cultural activities are provided. Teams may include adult and youth members 13 and older. Younger children may be accepted if accompanied by a parent and approved by the Ministry Center staff prior to the mission dates.

## MOVIE TRIP

Join us on **Sunday, August 1, 2010**, for the opening of *Countdown to Zero*. This stunning documentary was produced by Academy Award winner Lawrence Bender (*An Inconvenient Truth*, *Inglorious Bastards*) and written and directed by Lucy Walker (*The Devil's Playground*, *Blind Sight*) and focuses on the escalating global nuclear arms crisis. The film recently premiered at the Sundance Film Festival and the Cannes Film Festival and was shown at the United Nations Conference on nuclear weapons. The film is premiering in Chicago at the Landmark Century Theatre (2828 N. Clark) on July 30, 31 and Aug. 1, 2010.

We've been asked by North Suburban Peace Initiative and Physicians for Social Responsibility to come out and support this premiere to help ensure that the Landmark Century Theater is filled for each of the weekend showings. Our hope is that when people learn the truth and begin talking about it, telling their friends, writing letters to their newspapers, calling on President Obama and their elected officials to take action to reduce and eliminate nuclear weapons, we will begin to see progress on this very important issue.

The regular price for a ticket is \$11.00 for adults and \$8.50 for seniors and students. **BUMC purchased a block of ten tickets for the Sunday 4:10 show**, for discount price of \$6.00/per ticket. # YOUTH LOUNGE

## Youth Lounge Information and Opportunities

I've been working with the Youth Lounge for four months. It's just a once-a-month gathering at this point, but it's been enough to challenge me to change the way I look at the neighborhood that surrounds Broadway. At first I hesitated to tell Z I was interested in volunteering because I wasn't sure I wanted to commit to an ongoing project, but I'm certainly glad I did. Participating in the Youth Lounge has shown me how little I knew before and how much more I want to learn about people, communities, and just what a difference respect and trust can make.

It takes a special kind of attitude, vulnerability, and openness to work directly with the youth we're serving, and as I've worked with Z, Vernice, and the other volunteers in our training sessions, I'm learning how important it is not to lose sight of that. I'm so thankful for Z's many years of experience and for the vision and passion of our leadership.

Almost all the youth that walk through our doors every fourth Saturday are LGBTQA. Many are homeless, many participate in other youth programs in the area, and all seem relieved to walk through doors where no one searches their bags, no one demands to see ID, and no one tells them what they'll be doing for the next three and a half hours. We provide snacks and sometimes meals, and the youth are free to sit around and talk, play cards, listen to music, sing, dance, or play video games. We offer them space where they can feel welcomed and affirmed; this is a beautiful extension of Broadway's mission.

The volunteers who interact with the youth need to have received special training, and in the fall there will be another open conversation for prospective volunteers to learn about the different opportunities for service. In the meantime, we are looking for help from the larger church body with donations, set-up, and take-down.

We are always in need of items like soda, juice, chips, cookies, and candy for the youth to enjoy while in the building, and we also like to provide more substantial food options from time to time: for example chicken wings have been a popular item. We would like to have individual-size food and drink items folks can take with them when they leave as well. Ideas are sodas, bottles of water, cereal, chips, and apple-sauce. In addition, we're also looking to put together some toiletry kits that would include new and clean washcloths, toothbrushes, soap, feminine hygiene products, and travel-size toothpaste, shampoo, and conditioner. ## HISTORICAL NOTE

### An unorthodox motivation for church attendance?

“Passing of the Crisis” from *Church News*, July 1917 (excerpt)

The voice of Broadway is not hushed. It speaks! The crisis has passed, the people saved the day, and Broadway is on the map again. The turning point will not be forgotten; mark it down indelibly: “Sunday, January 14, 1917.” For on this day the people, strongly united, have candidly expressed themselves by untying their purse strings and opening up. Never before have the echoes resounded more vigorously than on that Sunday morn. Young men and young women, who formerly did not know of the wisdom and sweetness of giving to the Lord’s work, doubled their weekly gifts. Others, who never gave at all, took the initiative and subscribed their first gift. Let us be glad, genuinely glad, that the Lord has prospered us to maintain the church so that its power may be felt. Let us turn to Him and give thanks for what He has done.
