Lent is the perfect time for this – to slow down, to reflect, to "sit still," as Eliot writes. For, by tradition, it is the time set apart as a season of preparation for the greatest holy days of the Christian story: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, Easter Sunday. Historically it was a season of preparation for those to be baptized on Easter morning, after a two-year period of learning about the faith and its community.

## Vernice's View

As you receive this newsletter Ash Wednesday will be upon us. Ash Wednesday, March 9th, begins a 40 day journey of reflection and meditation, of questioning and discovering, that will lead us to Resurrection Day! We have many activities and educational opportunities to help us on that quest. I hope that each of us will take the opportunity to experience Lent in a personal and specific way by choosing to participate in one or more of the Lenten experiences.

Each week on Wednesday, during Lent, following guided meditation, we offer study and discussion about forgiveness. Using the book *The Bridge to Forgiveness: Stories and prayers for finding God and restoring wholeness*, we will define forgiveness and connect it to our own faith journey. My good friend, Rev. Jacki Belile from Living Well Ministries (see page 6 for more information) will introduce this study. On Sunday mornings at 10 am Tracy Nolan will lead us in a Queer Identity dialogue (see page 7). These are just two meaningful events happening in March; events that will help us travel deeper as we seek a clearer understanding of our connection with God and community. Please check out the other educational and spiritual occasions throughout Lent and Holy Week.

As we begin March, I want to take a moment and just say a special thank you to those who have been involved in the ongoing Multicultural Seminar Series which began last November and continued each Saturday in February. To the facilitators, to the participants and to the Anti-Racist White Caucus and the People of Color Discussion Groups, who co-hosted these workshops, I say thank you for staying at the table and enriching the conversation. Our perspectives and interactions were both educational and inspirational as we shared our stories, our challenges, our hopes and our dreams. Our expectation is to continue offering these types of occasions as we live into our vision of radical inclusion.

God calls us to stay the course. The journey and fun continues...

So, if I can take Eliot's advice, I have to discern, too, about what requires "to care" and "not to care" – the laundry is a daily task that seems trivial, but when I am overwhelmed by the needs of the world and the pain of injustice...well, frankly, I try to use a prayer approach to the laundry pile. I am reminded that Jesus went off, alone, to pray – to gain strength for the journey of turning the world upside down. I try to find a Biblical word or phrase that can sustain me and pray my way through laundry to discover a new energy to continue to walk the Jesus path.

With our Lenten theme this year, "Water for Our Souls," I'm going to use this line from Psalm 42 for my Lenten mantra: *As a deer gets thirsty for streams of water, I truly am thirsty for you, my God. In my heart, I am thirsty for you, the living God.* From the laundry or the paperwork, to the deeper ministry that calls us to live fully and to help others live fully, I'll be reciting that phrase this season. Because I am thirsty for God's life-giving water for my soul; I know I need it.

Dear Broadway friends;

The month of March is filled with great moments for Bloom. Foremost, it marks the eighth anniversary of our Sunday morning services. It gladdens my heart to note that occasionally we still sing from *The Faith We Sing* songbooks that you sent to us to have for our first service outside in the Palapas Art Gardens on March 9, 2003.

We are looking forward to our first Shrove (A.K.A. "Fat") Tuesday potluck supper celebration as a way to expand our Lenten traditions. Besides our regularly scheduled Ash Wednesday service the next night, we will have a new Lenten Wednesday night book study reading a new book by Harvard professor, James Kugel, [In the Valley of the Shadow](#). The author says he was set to thinking about his experience and religious issues when he was diagnosed with cancer. However, "My book isn't about turning to God in your hour of need. It's more about the essence of religious faith and what it's based on." These events will round out our church's established approach to the observance of Lent as a time for healing and growth.

The biggest deal in March for Bloom is our "Spring Fling 2 Cabaret and Silent Auction." This second annual event features 10 of the Coachella Valleys' well-known cabaret singers and musicians volunteering their talents because they think Bloom does effective ministry and is a good church. We are so grateful to them and the Bloomers who are the Cabaret Committee. This event does not fund our budget. It helps us raise money to have "a place of our own" some day (whatever that means as the Spirit leads us). You can read many more details about this March 4 event on [Bloom's Web site](#). On March 26, we are blessed to be one of the beneficiaries in the DeVona McLaughlin Cox Retrospective Art Sale and Open House. Rev. DeVona Cox was a retired religious Science minister and recognized artist living with her retired Religious Science minister husband Duane in Palm Springs. As a couple they served as co-presidents of the West Valley Interfaith Association for two years. I was their vice president. DeVona and Duane were/are friends of Bloom and Duane fills in as our preacher occasionally. In fact Bloom was the first place Duane preached after DeVona's death. He expressed that he thought it was good to experience Bloom this way during his grief recovery time. The benefit from the sale of DeVona's extensive body of work will take place in their mid-century modern home, which is in an architecturally noteworthy gold course neighborhood (that means something out here). 100-percent of the sales will contribute to three groups: the USO, another local religious science church in Palm Springs and Bloom.

### Seeking a new path: a time of renewal for the lgbt community

#### Faith communities partner in a bold and ecumenical approach to Lent

[Dignity/Chicago](#) and [Wisdom & Word Works](#), two organizations grounded in the Catholic tradition, will partner to present a program for Lent focused on a fresh approach to preparing for Easter.

The series begins with an **Ash Wednesday Service on March 9, 7:00 p.m.**, in the Sanctuary at 3338 N. Broadway in Chicago's Lakeview neighborhood, home to [Broadway United Methodist Church](#) (BUMC) and Dignity/Chicago. BUMC will be an ecumenical partner for the Ash Wednesday service, with pastors Revs. Lois McCullen Parr and Vernice Thorn co-presiding with Roman Catholic Womanpriest Rev. Barbara Zeman of Wisdom & Word Works and member of Dignity/Chicago's ministry team.

"We are really pleased to extend the radically inclusive model of Jesus by partnering with Dignity and Wisdom & Word Works," says Rev. Parr. "Our Broadway identity and ministry includes our dual commitments to be an anti-racist congregation as well as offering reconciling hospitality with GLBTQ folks. Leadership of people of color in our congregational life is a critical means for us to speak to the intersections of oppression," affirms Parr, who hopes that people who are searching for meaning will join the Lenten journey opportunities offered by these faith communities.

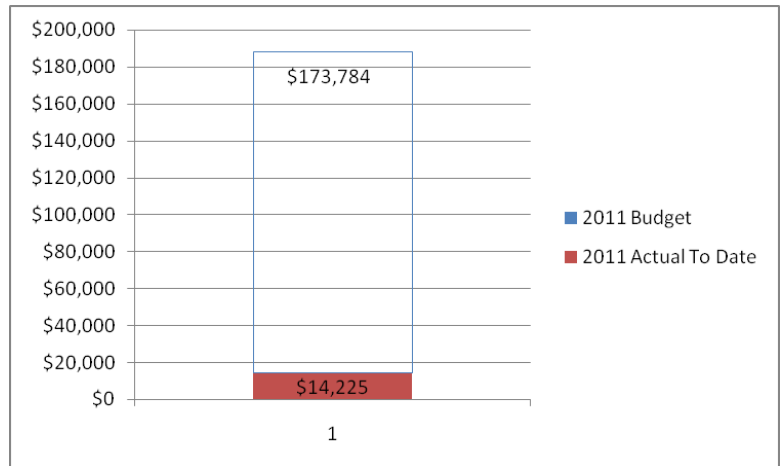


# FINANCE UPDATE

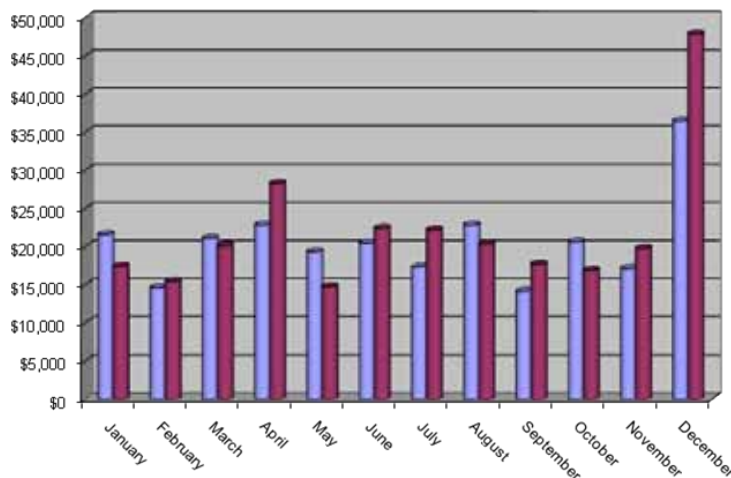
<b>Total Amount Received</b>	<b>\$19,906</b>

2010 was a tough financial year for this congregation. The year results are as follows.

Broadway also contributed over \$4,800 towards Mission Minutes in 2010. Additionally, we paid 25% of our apportionments, which, although it may seem like a small amount, still contributed to helping the Northern Illinois Conference pay 100% of its General Church apportionments in 2010 for the first time in three years!

# NEWS OF MOVEMENTS FOR CHANGE

As we helped financially support Church Within a Church (CWAC) last month for our Mission Minute, we were reminded of Broadway's commitments to witnessing what we believe the Church can be...

That witness comes in part through our partnerships with multiple ministries that support the full inclusion of all God's children in the life and ministry of the Church.

We are a member organization of CWAC, the Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN), and the Chicago Coalition of Welcoming Churches (CWC).

Last month we welcomed parents of the Reconciling movement (Parents Reconciling Network – PRN) to Worship, as we hosted their three-day meeting.



There are many ways we continue to “be the change we wish to see in the world” (Gandhi); our opportunities for individual and Broadway efforts include:

- \* supporting CWAC with our February Mission Minute
- 
- \* learning about the legislation that Broadway is co-sponsoring with other Reconciling Churches in the Northern Illinois Conference
    - \* the legislation goes to our Annual Conference this summer, in hopes of heading to General Conference in 2012, the event that occurs every four years in our global denomination that sets polity and practice for the UMC
    - \* legislation addresses the homophobic language of the UMC's current *Book of Discipline*, supports marriage between two individuals (rather than a man and woman), supports ordination of GLBTQ persons, among other related issues
    - \* find copies of the legislation online at <http://www.euclidumc.org/petitions.htm>, or see Lois for copies
  - \* learning about the lesbian pastor in Wisconsin who will be on “church trial” in April – read about Amy's trial and Gil Caldwell's commentary on the information available in Friendship Hall
    - \* go to “love on trial” to support Amy's case and to receive updates on this historic opportunity for the UMC
    - \* many believe that Amy's trial prompted the recent statement of conscience by 33 retired UM Bishops that calls for a church change

## HISTORICAL NOTE

### Something we might try?

“Pastor’s column” (excerpt) from *Broadway Methodist*, April 1924

Meetings were conducted by the pastor in the church four evenings during the week preceding Easter. Thursday evening an old fashioned Methodist Love Feast\* was held, with bread and water as the emblems serving as an expression of fellowship, followed by a testimony service. The attendance upon these meetings was good and from what was said we judged the spiritual benefit received by those attending was real. The pastor was much pleased with the spiritual tone of the meetings night after night and thinks they were well worthwhile from every standpoint.

The church was filled with people both Sunday morning and evening on Easter and an uplifting influence was felt by all. The choir under the able direction of Mrs. N.M. Cummings delighted the people in the morning service.

\*Editor’s note: This was the tradition of AGAPE, a simplified version of the last supper, practiced by some early Christians. After dying out for centuries, it was revived in the early 18th century by some reformed churches. John Wesley brought it to early Methodism, probably influenced by Moravians.
