The Broadway — October 2011

I am only one, but still I am one. I can't do everything, but still I can do something. And because I can't do everything, I will not refuse to do the something that I can do.
~ Helen Keller

Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world. ~ Archbishop Desmond Tutu

A little bit of bread and a shared cup can change the world.

It may not seem possible, but witnesses will tell you that a little bit of bread and a shared cup has transformed *them*...and those individuals do, indeed, change the world. Because what we pray for, when we share that bread and cup, is that we will go from the Table strengthened by our Communion to give ourselves to the world.

Liturgical scholars call this Table action the “four-fold formula” – take, bless, break, give. It’s what Jesus did, as reported in scripture about the miracle feedings and his “last supper” with friends. It’s what Henri Nouwen claims is true for each of us, too, as God’s children: God “*takes*” us (chooses us); *blesses* us (in original blessing, we are called “good”); we are *broken* (by the world, by our own choice); we are *given* (our brokenness changes us forever, and our compassion is enlarged and our capacity to give ourselves to others is increased).

On Sunday, October 2nd, we share in that four-fold formula with Christians the earth-over, as we celebrate World Communion Sunday. I’m thinking differently about that solidarity this year as I consider Broadway and our community of progressive Christians. Many of us come to the Table having been told in an earlier time that we weren’t welcome. Many of us come as those who still identify as on the margins – sometimes feeling that we are at the edge of grace. That “margin” location, I believe, is a powerful one as we witness to the world of Christians. When we tell our story, as Broadway – and we share our stories as the individuals who make up Broadway – our stories enlarge God’s story for others.

I often feel like the task to “transform the world” (this phrase is part of the United Methodist mission statement) is just too big, but then I see the tiny but significant ways in which one person can make a difference in one other person’s life, and I know that Helen Keller’s saying is true: I can do *something*.

Broadway’s got a busy couple months – even as our ongoing schedule of events continues (and our new schedule for Education and Spiritual Formation is set; new studies begin this week), we have three congregational meetings coming up (see page 4 for information about Hannah’s candidacy for Ordination; page 10 about Marriage Equality; and page 14 for our Annual Church/Charge Conference date). In these pages you’ll see other events: we bless the animals; we welcome Rev. David Weekley; we celebrate Extraordinary Ordination with Church Within A Church; we’ll end October with Hispanic Heritage Sunday on the 30th. November brings our Festival of the Global Village, we’ll welcome Rev. Kev, we’ll hold our Thanksgiving Feast, and we’ll begin Advent.

World Communion Sunday signals the start of our church season cycle. From now until next Memorial Day, we will be doing our best to uplift and heal one another with worship, service and learning. We will continue a community welcome that is wide and deep. We will agitate for God's peace and justice. We hope to get a choir started. We will do our best to learn to be generous in financial support of our ministry. That's a lot.

You may remember that Bloom is both Broadway's off-spring and the first new church start of the [Church Within A Church Movement](#). Mike and Rev. Kev were among the founders of CWAC in 2002 and continue to be nurtured and taught in important ways by CWAC involvement. Travel to meetings elsewhere and CWAC's support here keep Bloom going with moral support and motivational memories.

This month, for the first time, Bloom will have more than only Rev. Kev and Mike representing Bloom outside Palm Springs at a [Church Within A Church Movement](#) event– "[Living Justice in the Wilderness.](#)" Dedicated Bloomers Ron and Linda Lang will travel along to Tucson, Arizona, for the CWAC meetings and [second Extraordinary Ordination](#) Service on October 23. Ron and Linda come from Methodist backgrounds. Ron is a retired UM minister who, as he says, "had the door shut" on him. They came to Bloom looking for a "Reconciling" church. They are great blessings to us.

Like many clergy and lay people from the United Methodist Church, this extraordinary ordination ceremony must live outside of a United Methodist Church in order to have life with integrity. For "some reason," no UMC buildings were able to welcome this event – the door was shut. That's why the meetings and the ordination are taking place in a Presbyterian church.

Even with the lockout, I am glad to know that many United Methodists from Tucson and elsewhere are working hard to support this action where it's at. Furthermore, meeting in a Presbyterian church gives CWAC an opportunity to celebrate that denomination's decision last summer to enact restorative justice and support the ordination of LGBT people. This strengthens CWAC's ecumenical connection. The collaborative experience will provide memories and commentary for us all.

Back home on October 30, Bloom will gather for our Fall Congregation Meeting. At this time we will tend to organizational matters and celebrate the continuation of our ministry together. This will also be the kick-off of our 2012 stewardship campaign. Bloom faces challenges just like many churches.

Our October Mission Minute is Lakeview Pantry.

Founded in 1970, Lakeview Pantry is a non-profit organization with the mission of eliminating hunger in Lakeview. LVP provides food to hungry people and strives to increase the independence of clients through self help initiatives. They focus on specific client issues that lead to food insecurity such as unemployment and housing instability, while striving to raise community awareness of poverty and its solutions. From two locations six days a week, LVP distributes over one million pounds of **food, personal hygiene products, and pet food** each year to individuals in need in the Lakeview community. They have weekend and evening hours to accommodate working families, as well as a home delivery program serving homebound elderly and disabled people. LVP's mission could not be accomplished without the work of their 400 volunteers. Less than 5% of their funding comes from government sources, 60% comes from individuals. The rest comes from local businesses, philanthropic organizations, and religious communities like us. Let's give to this worthy organization.

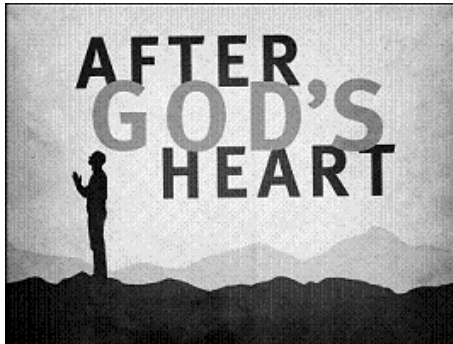

David Weekley is an ordained United Methodist pastor in Portland, Oregon. He received his BA in Psychology from Cleveland State University in 1976 and entered seminary at Boston University School of Theology, where he earned an MDiv in 1982. He has served churches in the Oregon-Idaho Annual Conference for nearly thirty years. David has recently published his story in his book *In From the Wilderness*, in which he tells his journey as a transgender person. He writes: “I am very positive about sharing my story, because I believe it is the best way to help educate our society about transgender persons; there is so much misinformation out there, and fear, that it seems imperative to become active. Because some segments of the Church are responsible for a portion of this misinformation and fear, it seems even more critical for others to hear a positive and personal faith story from a transgender person.”

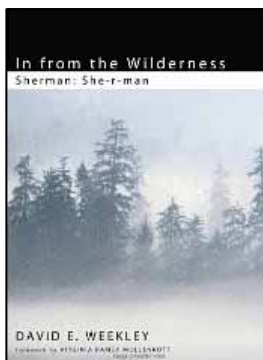

Broadway United Methodist Church -Commitment to Marriage Equality

While we strive to extend the radical hospitality that God asks of us, we acknowledge that we have often failed to do so. We lament that many state and religious institutions, including the United Methodist Church, deny LGBTQI-identified couples equal access to marriage and all of its blessings, rights, and responsibilities. Currently, it is violation of UMC law for an ordained minister to marry two people of the same sex or gender. Additionally, it is a violation of church law for us to allow two people of the same sex or gender to exchange marriage vows in our sanctuary.

At Broadway, we believe that this current UMC law is unjust and inconsistent with the Gospel of Jesus Christ and God's abundant love, which is our true authority. In order to stand in fairness and in solidarity with LGBTQI members of the community, Broadway's policy on holy unions and marriage has been that no couple may marry in the church sanctuary. Rather, couples exchange vows off-site, and following that, couples may celebrate with the community in worship in the sanctuary. This policy was adopted in 2001 by congregational vote.

We rejoice that at this point in history, the arc of justice now bends toward marriage equality for all couples. As of June 1, 2011, the State of Illinois legally recognizes civil unions for LGBTQI-identified couples, giving them access to state rights and obligations of civil marriage. This important law creates an opportunity for Broadway to open the doors of our sanctuary to all couples who wish to share their vows and seek the blessing of the church for their marriages.

We believe as an inclusive faith community and as ordained clergy we are called to minister to all. It is appropriate, indeed a privilege to celebrate all covenantal relationships between two persons who wish to marry each other. Our faith community affirms the sacred truth that the vows couples make are the heart of the union – both pastors and the congregation are witnesses to the power of a couple to name the promises they make to one another.

Today we, the congregation of Broadway United Methodist Church, affirm that God's grace is open to all, and we witness to that grace through our commitment to justice and equality in our congregation, the State of Illinois, the United Methodist Church, and the world. We will honor any couple who seeks to commit their lives to one another in marriage.

Congregational vote to approve this draft will be held October 9, 2011 (see above).

We work toward the day when we have hundreds of member communities like Broadway.

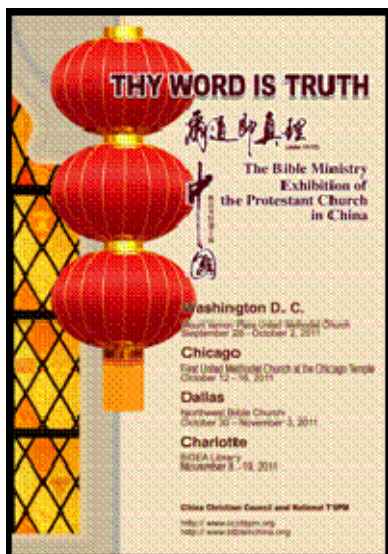

From the Bishop's Office

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

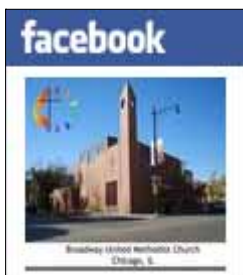

“Pastor’s personal message” (excerpt) from *Broadway Methodist*, June 1929

We have already begun to feel the effects of another vacation season. Many familiar faces were missing as I looked out over the audiences last Sunday. The church will adapt itself to vacation condition by suspending the Sunday evening service during July and August.

What shall be our attitude towards this vacation period of decreased or changed religious activity? Shall we allow our spirits to go into a tailspin or a nosedive because of it? Shall we succumb to the ravages of ecclesiastical blues because the usual numbers are not on hand for worship? Will we count the summer months a total loss from the standpoint of church work?

It may be a very religious thing to take a vacation. I am persuaded that Jesus, tired in His work, but never tired of His work, enjoyed frequent periods of rest and recreation. He is Lord even of the vacation season. The ideal vacation then will be one with proportionate provision for the recreation of body, mind and spirit.

Because increasing numbers of people are taking this kind of vacation, the summer period is becoming one of the most spiritually fruitful seasons of the year.
