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Letter from Lois

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.

~ Hebrews 13:1-2

We have seen what the power of an awakened people can accomplish.

~ Tom Black, in "We have won justice before. We can win it again."

I'm grateful for the Broadway community of faith as we have taken the time and space to be honest about the pain and anger that have come in the wake of the Florida trial verdict and the way the name "Trayvon" has become an awakening for our nation's conversation about racism and white privilege and power. I'm grateful for the real tears, and the heart-beat of rage that desires to make the world safer and better.

Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s words that we used in Broadway's Pride month here ring as true now as ever: "We are tied together in the single garment of destiny, caught in an inescapable network of mutuality." The reality of our common life is a call of *faith* – a trust that we are connected to one another in deep, profound ways.

I was moved to read what Sojourners' Jim Wallis wrote as the national conversation plays out, a piece called "Lament From a White Father," in which he called on people of faith to recognize that racism is a sin in the eyes of God:

This is not just about verdicts but also about values...And the impact of race in and on this case, this trial, and the response to it around the country must now all be centrally addressed...there is a religious message here for all Christians. If there ever was a time that demonstrated why racially and culturally diverse congregations are needed – that time is now. The body of Christ is meant, instructed, and

commanded by Christ to be racially inclusive... White Christians cannot and must not leave the sole responsibility of telling the truth about America, how it has failed Trayvon Martin and so many black Americans, solely to their African-American brothers and sisters in Christ. It's time for white Christians to listen to their black brothers and sisters, to learn their stories, and to speak out for racial justice and reconciliation. The country needs multi-racial communities of faith to show us how to live together.

This is our call as Broadway, as we continue on the anti-racism, multi-cultural journey: to learn and to teach how to live together as God's people, people who understand both self-love and mutual love. The claiming of "beloved-ness" for ourselves and for all people gives hope to the world.

Vernice's View

The song "Celebrate Good Times" sung by Kool and the Gang has been running through my mind all morning. That's what August reminds me of - vacation, family reunions, hot weather - good times - times to celebrate. And as I reflect on a couple events from the past weeks I find good reason to celebrate.

In June during Pride month many of you were with us as we celebrated the justice ministry of Greg Dell. We centered ourselves around these words from Dr. King:

"We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly."

Those were appropriate words to center us as we celebrated a person who spent a great deal of his life preaching, teaching and living those words. Greg is retired now and living with Parkinson's disease and yet even now he continues to speak out for justice and inclusivity. Greg was unable to attend the awards service and

he and Jade asked that I receive the award for him. It was a great honor to do so. The ministry that Greg and I shared has left an imprint on every aspect of my life and ministry. And I wanted to share with you some of the words I shared with those gathered that evening as I accepted Greg's award.

I began my ministry at Broadway 12 years ago as a student. Greg was my supervisor, my mentor, my colleague and he remains a close friend. Like many of you Greg's inclusive ministry and authentic walk for justice has influenced and changed my life. I talked with Greg this week to ask if he had any words to convey to you all and he said to express his thanks and regrets for not being here tonight. He also said that he hopes his ministry has been seen as one that addresses the intersections of oppression of race, gender and sexual orientation.

When I came to Broadway, inclusive ministry was not a part of my vocabulary yet. It is because of Greg Dell and Broadway that I was able to

celebrate another event in my life. I finally completed a long process of transferring my ordination credentials to Church Within A Church Movement. On July 20, 2013, a small group of CWACM leadership and members gathered to participate and witness this event. And in just a few days, on August 4th, all of you here at Broadway will celebrate with me as well.

I am most thankful to CWACM and to Broadway and to my mentor and friend Greg Dell and my current colleague in ministry, Lois McCullen Parr, for creating the space for me to authentically name, claim and live my inclusive ministry. Thank you all for your love and support.

Kevin's Korner

Background note: Rev. Kevin A. In the context of "doing ministry," I have been asked to write quarterly for a rotating column in The Desert Sun newspaper. The following appeared online this month.

"Words of Faith" July 12, 2013

I believe faith is an action word. It is not only evidenced by thoughts and words that swirl in our hearts and minds. It is proven also by the actions we take with our bodies. I believe that a major component of the witness to faith is what we do in light of it.

For me, faith is unmistakably devoted to actions of God's justice and compassion in our communities locally and globally. If, as the old saying goes, "the proof of the pudding is in the eating," the pudding is faith and the eating is social justice. While not everyone is called in faith to do the same

things, everyone can do something for good.

For some, religion and spirituality are confined to what is inward. I respect that. As a Christian, I think that is not the sum total of our discipleship. Inward work, as Jesus did when he went into the wilderness or away for prayer, will strengthen the followers of the Jesus Way to do outward work of healing and justice – as Jesus did.

That is why, as a delegate to the recent United Church of Christ General Synod 29 meeting in Long Beach, I joined 300 people in a march for "Just Immigration Reform." The promotional flyer proclaimed the group's purpose to: "Put your faith into action! Stop Deportations and Pass Inclusive Immigration Reform!"

We marched a mile for immigration justice at Noon that day. I considered

it a privilege to walk with immigrants and Dreamers marching for family unity and a pathway to citizenship in common sense comprehensive immigration reform. "Yes we can!" and "Si se puerde!" were shouts heard all along the route.

Church leaders "baptized" the Federal Building containing the ICE office in Long Beach, washed the feet of immigrants at City Hall and shared bread in a plaza outside the local Congressional offices. Along the way we followed our leaders' directions to "keep moving for justice."

In the faith actions of personal devotion and big church meetings, there are always ways today to make real the ancient words of Jesus: "Go and do likewise."

As always, we ask you to keep us in your prayers. We will pray for you.

Draw the Circle Wide Gift to Rev. Dell

Rev. Greg Dell received *Draw the Circle Wide*, a commissioned Thanksgiving Gift from the Chicago Coalition of Welcoming Churches, on June 23, 2013.



THE REV. GREGORY R. DELL, now retired, is the former pastor of Broadway United Methodist Church. Dell has a 44-year history of involvement in issues of social justice and has been a pioneering and courageous supporter of same-sex unions in the face of opposition from his own church and elsewhere. He is a staunch friend of LGBT communities in Chicago, across the United States, and around the world.

A native Chicagoan, Greg Dell was born in 1945 and raised mostly on Chicago's South Side. While still in high school in Midlothian, Illinois, Dell participated in the marches and efforts to challenge racism in Chicago neighborhoods led by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

In March 1999, Dell was sub-

jected to a nationally publicized church trial that resulted from charges filed against him within the United Methodist Church for conducting a Service of Holy Union for two gay men from his Broadway UMC congregation. The result of the trial was a yearlong suspension from his pastoral duties. Afterward, Dell returned to Broadway Church and continued his activities as an ally in the struggle for racial-, gender-, and sexual orientation-based justice. He has received numerous awards, including a Chicago Commission on Human Relations award in 2000, and honorary doctorates from Illinois Wesleyan University (1999) and Chicago Theological Seminary (2007).

Dell was forced by illness to take early retirement from pastoral ministry in mid-2007. He and his wife, Jade, have been married for 40 years. Throughout his career, he has served as an exemplary ally to LGBT communities in Chicago and beyond and as a model activist for social justice. For his life and work, he was chosen for induction into the Chicago Gay and Lesbian Hall of Fame as a Friend of the Community in 2008. (Source: *Chicago Gay and Lesbian Hall of Fame, 2008.*)

come? I thought a set of nesting bowls would characterize how we are all separate but part of a larger creation. We are a community which is made up of layers, each contributing in their own way to a beautiful co-existence. There are four parts to this single piece, each having their own significance.

The center piece: Inscribed on the bottom with "Draw the Circle Wide," this is a pouring vessel, symbolizing how Greg has poured out his life so that many could be nourished by his teachings and his work for justice.

The next layer is a small bowl carved into a flower: Inscribed on the bottom with "In Christ, Belonging to Life," this bowl represents those who know Greg professionally, yet another layer of support, holding up Greg as well as his friends and family, offering their own teaching, guidance, and support throughout Greg's successes as well as his struggles.

The final layer is a larger bowl also carved with a flower pattern: Inscribed on the bottom with "Shaped by God's Very Hand," this bowl represents the congregations, acquaintances, and the larger community served by Greg's work as well as the work of those who support Greg.

When you put all of these items together, it is symbolic of how we all come together as God's creation like the many petals of a beautiful flower; alone we are beautiful but when we come together we create a more beautiful creation. At the center, in this case, we find Greg Dell as the nucleus through which God's presence has touched so many, helping the flower of community to grow larger and more beautiful. From Z's acceptance speech: *In the near sixty years of MY life anyone that I have ever allowed to get close enough to know me would undoubtedly agree (good or bad) when I say that I am a comfortably controversial individual. Controversial in the since that I never really am comfortable with staying within the margins of what is considered easy or safe. Never fully accepted the status quo of "That is just the way it's supposed to be" or "That is just the way things have to be done."* Through the years this mindset has been reflected in the androgynous way that I dressed, the way that I thought and how I viewed the world. But EVEN with this mindset I would only allow myself go so far in my self-expression. Being a "soft" black gay male in this world was challenging enough and even though that "role" never felt right for me, it was far safer than accepting the fact that I was even more different. The severe punishments for experimenting with my gender expression in my childhood (even for the simplest thing as putting on makeup or women's clothing) branded me. The distinction between sexual orientation and gender expression is more clearly understood and is in more conversation today. How could I accept the fact that I was trans and that this was right for me? How could I ever bridge that divide in my life? I wanted it but there were not enough voices out there in the world (gay or secular) that told me that "Z, IT IS WORTH IT TO BE TRANS". I would have been supported by dear friends and good therapists in my transition but still I didn't dare to take that leap. The cost would be too high. In the last decade that all began to change for me because of my work with remarkable young people at CCC, at The Center On Halsted, and with the "love work" that we call Youth Lounge at Broadway United Methodist Church. They gave me the courage to take that leap and to accept the fact of who I am today. Many of them called me mother Z even before I began physical transitioning. In spite of the marginalization and the dangers, it was their collective voice that said, "IT IS WORTH IT BE TRANS." In spite of the stereotyping and the pain that it requires, it is still their voice that says to me, "Z, IT IS WORTH IT TO BE TRANS". And YES, because of the wholeness and joy that this journey has brought into my life, I can stand before you here today and say, "YES, I AM A TRANS FEMALE AND IT IS WORTH IT." We trans, female and male, young and old, we are here and we are going to make our voices known, and we are going to make your lives richer because we are here. So in the final analysis (for me) it is not what I have tried to do over the years to give to our youth the love and decency I feel they deserve, but it is what they have given to me in return. It's true that our future is in our youth but I can stand here before you today and say that my future is because of our youth. They have given me, "ME". I am thankful for them and I love them dearly. I thank you for this Esteem Award and I accept it for them.

Lakeview Pantry's Partnership with Broadway's Youth Lounge



Most of us know the Lakeview Pantry provides food, personal hygiene products, household supplies, pet food and clothes for individuals and families in need in Lakeview. We may know the Pantry has been in operation since 1970 and has a broader mission of eliminating hunger in Lakeview, as well as focusing on client issues that lead to food insecurity. Another of their goals is to increase networking and sharing of information between Broadway United Methodist Church and the Pantry. What some of us may not know is that the Pantry donates excess food and need-

ed items from their donor network to other community programs in Lakeview. The exciting news is that the Pantry, because of their community support, will provide some of their excess to support our Youth Lounge programming.

The Pantry's contributions make our monthly requests for additional donations easier, but we will still need donations from our congregation who has always been so supportive of Youth Lounge. For example, the Pantry will not be able to provide paper goods or soda, among other items.

Another important but sometimes overlooked service the Pantry provides is to homeless individuals and families with no permanent address. People can apply at a Pantry location, go through their intake process, then visit the Pantry once a month to receive food and other items plus weekly bread and produce. Pantry locations are at 3831 North Broadway Street and 1414 West Oakdale Avenue.
