MISSION MINUTE: Heifer International

Heifer International's mission is to work with communities to end world hunger and poverty and to care for the Earth. Dan West was a farmer from the American Midwest and member of the Church of the Brethren who went to the front lines of the Spanish Civil War as an aid worker. His mission was to provide relief, but he soon discovered the meager single cup of milk rationed to the weary refugees once a day was not enough. And then he had a thought: What if they had not a cup, but a cow? That "teach a man to fish" philosophy is what drove West to found Heifer International. And now, nearly 70 years later, that philosophy still inspires our work to end world hunger and poverty throughout the world once and for all. Heifer International is a Rainbow Covenant mission of the UM, www.heifer.org. Visit them to find out how goat farmers were able to find success in Festival sales, in spite of Covid-19 complications. About the Rainbow Covenant: The first mile in becoming a Rainbow Covenant Church is to fully participate in the mission and ministry of the Northern Illinois Conference through 100% apportionment giving. The second mile of giving is becoming a Rainbow Covenant Church, by supporting a designated mission within each color of the rainbow. The Sowers know that BUMC has not yet met the 100% apportionment goal; so while we are not a Rainbow Covenant Church, we strive to incorporate at least one Rainbow mission project in our yearly missions. Rev. Ronald Graham


