SCRIPTURE READING: Judges 4:4-5, 9, 16-22 (Inclusive Bible)

At this time the prophet Deborah, who was married to Lappidoth, was the governor of Israel. She held court under Deborah's Palm between Ramah and Bethel in the hill country of Ephraim. The Israelites came to her for arbitration..."Very well, I will go with you," she replied, "but then you won't have the honor of victory from this battle—for YHWH will deliver Sisera into the hands of a woman!"...Barak pursued Sisera's chariots and army as far as Harosheth Haggoyim. Sisera's troops were put to the sword. No one survived the encounter. While this was happening, Sisera found refuge in the tent of Jael, the wife of Heber the Kenite, because Jabin the ruler of Hazor and the family of Heber the Kinite were on friendly terms. Jael stepped outside the tent to meet Sisera, saying, "Enter, sir! Come in, and have no fear." Sisera entered the tent and Jael hid him under a blanket. He said, "I am thirsty. Give me a drink of water." She opened a skin of milk and gave him some to drink, then covered him once more. "Stand in the tent entrance," he said. "If anyone comes and asks whether a man is here, tell them No." The exhausted Sisera immediately fell into a deep sleep. Then Jael took a tent peg, picked up a mallet, and crept closely to the general and drove the peg through his temple and into the ground, killing him. When Barak came by searching for the fugitive, Jael went out to greet him, and said, "Come, I will show you the person you seek." So he entered the tent after her and found Sisera dead with a tent peg through his temple.

GOSPEL READING: Luke 22:7-13 (Inclusive Bible)

When the day of the Feast of the Unleavened Bread arrived, when the Passover lamb was to be sacrificed, Jesus sent Peter and John out with the instructions, "Go and make the preparations for us to eat the Passover." They asked, "Where do you want us to prepare the seder?" Jesus answered, "When you enter the city, a man will meet you carrying a jar of water. Follow him into the house he enters. Say to the owner of the house, 'The Rabbi asks, "Where is the guest room where I can eat the Passover seder with my disciples?"' The owner will show you a large furnished upper room. Make the preparations there." They went out and found everything as Jesus had told them. And they prepared the Passover.

This is the Word of God for all of God's people. Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL READING: John 21:20-23 (Inclusive Bible)

Peter turned around and noticed that the disciple whom Jesus loved was following them—the one who had leaned over during the supper and asked, "Rabbi, which one will hand you over?" Seeing him, Peter was prompted to ask, "But what about him, Rabbi?" Jesus replied, "If I want him to stay behind until I come, what does it matter to you? You're to follow me." This is

how the rumor spread among the sisters and brothers that this disciple would not die. Yet Jesus had not said to Peter, "He won't die," but rather, "If I want him to stay behind until I come, what does it matter to you?"


BENEDICTION

June Mission Minute: CLASP

CLASP: Chicago LGBT Asylum Support Partners. This non-for profit was begun about 10 years ago to lend support to new immigrants who have arrived in the US to find a safer space and place to live than their home country where often sexual discrimination can be as serious as death. The entry to a

new country is not easy especially when seeking asylum. The legal process is very complicated and intimidating and during these months and sometimes years, CLASP lends financial support in providing transportation passes, helping with basic needs and if needed some housing and legal help until the recipient can find work. CLASP is not a part of Broadway Church but former pastor Lois Parr was one of the original organizers and over the years several Broadway members have been a part of the steering committee, as well as our Pastor Alka. This is not a large organization but the help and support is meaningful and the stories of discrimination tear the heart. Community Food Pantry

The events of the last year have affected us all differently and as we begin to see a light at the end of the tunnel, many are still struggling. The Community Food Pantry outside BUMC is there for anyone in need but it's often EMPTY! We invite all who are able to pick up a few items next time you're at the grocery store and drop them off in our Community Food Pantry!

Suggested items: canned meat or other protein items (tuna, salmon, chicken), crackers, peanut butter, canned soups and stews, canned fruits and vegetables, canned beans, pasta, rice, olive oil or Canola oil, powdered milk, spices (salt, pepper, garlic powder, onion salt, oregano, etc.), granola bars, applesauce, nuts, instant mashed potatoes.

Items to Skip: items that have to be refrigerated, items with glass packaging, items that need special equipment to open (pop-top cans are the best!), items that require too many extra ingredients, items that are expired, items that are homemade or have already been opened.

Looking Ahead: Pride Parade on Sunday, October 3, 2021

The parade kicks off at noon on Sunday, October 3, 2021, at Montrose Avenue and Broadway in Uptown and ends near the intersection of Diversey Parkway and Sheridan Road in Lincoln Park.

The roar of the crowd heralds the start of the Pride Parade, a dazzling cavalcade of diversity. The streets are lined 12 people deep as 750,000 people cheer the contingents on and enjoy the show, culture and experience! For the liveliest viewing spots head to North Halsted Street, between Belmont Avenue and Grace Street. If you are seeking a less crowded area to view the parade, look for your viewing spots near the beginning of the route along Broadway between Montrose Avenue and Sheridan Road or further along Broadway between Belmont Avenue and Diversey Parkway.

Transit information is available at transitchicago.com/prideparade. Buy your fare in advance to avoid long lines or use Apple Pay, Google Pay, or Samsung Pay to tap on to a bus or train. Avoid driving, Lyft, Uber, or Via. Facebook event here.
