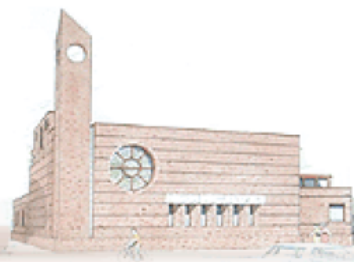

Letter from Lois

*Take me back/take me back, dear Lord/to the place/where I first received You.
Take me back/take me back, dear Lord/where I first believed. ~ Andrae Crouch*

I'm still hearing Latoya and Chatmon's voices in my head, the joy of their singing together and the sound of their harmonies...and the message I needed to hear that Sunday, a call to remember where I first believed.

I'm a church kid – grew up sitting between my parents and Granny each week in Muskegon, Michigan; I sang in my first choir there at age five. When I began my ordination process, someone on a committee asked me “when did you meet Jesus?” I was stunned at first to try to answer this, so I responded with a question: “Which time would you like me to talk about?”

This is the thing: I keep “meeting Jesus” over and over again, each time my faith grows deeper and richer. I first met Jesus at home, with my family, at the dinner table. I got to know Jesus better growing up in a family of faith that held me in their Baptismal covenant to me, to teach me about the life of God and God's people. I argued with Jesus as a teenager, wondering how there could be only ONE way. Jesus chased me to college, where I began singing in the adult choir, standing next to my Daddy. Throughout my life, I've found my way to several different congregations – mostly United Methodist – and each has introduced me to new ways of understanding Jesus.

But the way I answered that committee member's question was that it was in my therapist's office that *Jesus came to me* in a powerful way, when I was dragging in depression. “You do not earn my love,” I heard, “you are worthy.” It was this epiphany I thought of Sunday when I heard daughter & father Thorn singing. This is where I “went back” to the place where I believed.

What about you? This month of February invites us to so many opportunities to enlarge how we understand Jesus and God's community of faith called Broadway. We are invited to another powerful year of Black History Month as our “Acts of Faith” theme continues to shape who we are into the future as a multi-cultural community who honors and celebrates ALL. We are invited to the profound season of Lent, that time of self-reflection and renewal that calls us to re-connect with the God of love again.

The Education team is in the process of putting together Broadway's Safe Sanctuary Policy. We met in January and had a very productive meeting.

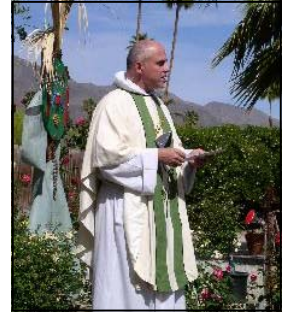

Kevin's Korner

February 2013

Background note: Rev. Kevin A. Johnson and Mike Shear are BUMC members who moved to Palm Springs, California, in July 2002, to begin Bloom in the Desert Ministries, which is an interdenominational, inclusive Christian ministry including the Methodist (Broadway style) tradition. "Kevin's Korner" is a monthly column reporting on their progress so Broadway and Bloom stay well connected in ministry together. (www.bloominthedesert.org)



Sometimes it is better to hear from a Bloomer's Korner than from Rev. Kev's. Here is a personal statement about experiencing Bloom written recently by David Sanchez:

I retired in June of 2012 after a very exciting 12 year run in a leadership position with the California Teachers Association, the last four years as the first Latino and openly gay President of the 325,000 members that make up the CTA. I lived a very hectic lifestyle for those 12 years, advocating for California's students and teachers. I had some incredible experiences and grateful to the good Lord for giving me the opportunity to be in a position of leadership on behalf of public education, public school educators, and human and civil rights. I was President of the CTA when we voted to support the NO on Prop 8 campaign and support marriage equality for all people.

I knew that when I retired my life would take on a different direction. I no longer would have to rush to the airport to make that flight to Sacramento or DC, no longer have to be at meetings all day, conferences on the weekends, and have very little time at home or with family. My life was indeed going to be quite different.

What I knew I wanted to do was to first get involved with my new community. I knew that I needed to find a church that would welcome me and allow me to once again get back to developing a spiritual relationship. I knew that deep down I really wanted to get back to my favorite passion, singing with a chorus. I grew up in a singing family, sang in school and church, sang with the men's glee in college, traveled for three years with Up With People, it was time to get back to it. The question for me was, where?

In January of 2012 I was accepted into the Palm Springs Gay Men's chorus and was delighted to be a part of a group of men who shared my love for singing. It was at one of those rehearsals that a member of Bloom in the Desert Ministries invited me to participate in singing the tenor part for The Hallelujah Chorus at their Easter Sunday service. I have never had that opportunity to sing that beautiful song, and looked forward to learning the part and singing it to support the Bloom in the Desert Choir. Little did I know that because of that song and desire to help the choir, I would fall in love with the ministry of the church, the folks who attend the church, and their unconditional acceptance for who I am and not what I am.

My desire to return to music and singing has once again given me the opportunity to reestablish my relationship with the good Lord, to put my trust in a spiritual leader and congregation, and to be a part of a movement that is giving back to the community. My goal is to share that joy with my family and friends and to make them feel welcome to Bloom in the Desert Ministries where all are welcomed.

HELP SOWERS SOW SEEDS, RESPOND TO 2012 KENYAN CROP FAILURE —
TENWEK ORPHANAGES NEED FUNDS FOR FOOD

Each year for the last ten years, one of Broadway's Mission Minutes has been directed toward Tenwek Hospital and Dr. Bemm, a Christian pediatrician who gave up his practice in a Pittsburgh clinic. With his wife, Amy, a licensed registered nurse, they sold their home and moved to Tenwek Hospital in Kenya, west Africa, with their three young children — Lydia, David, and Abigail. Over the last six years they have adopted four African children. This recent photo shows Amy, and Dr. Bemm with the family of seven children.



Last year Dr. Bemm directed our attention to \$300, treadle operated, sewing machines needed by two more orphanages, as we saw photos of children with torn clothes gathered around one of these machines making repairs. Broadway sent funds for both with over \$100 extra for sewing supplies. Thank you!!

2012 was a bad year for agriculture in Africa. The corn crop was destroyed by a three- year fungus that will last in the ground for two more years. It has greatly hurt the orphanage's food supply and the government won't give out free food until many people start to die from starvation.

Cassava, sweet potatoes, and sorghum have been planted this year in place of maize. The orphans are still very low on food for everyday needs. Local Christians are praying the cassava will be enjoyed by the children, but they have never eaten it before and it is harder to cook than maize. Dr Bemm says "Ughhhhhhhh.... when you have 300 hungry children you wonder what the right thing to do is???? Yes, the easy answer is FEED THEM. That is much easier said than done." Before the fungus situation, a \$50 sack of maize could feed 30 children for a month. During these last months, the Bemm Family has had many requests at their door for food.

As a pediatrician at Tenwek, Dr. Bemm trains others as he provides medical care for expecting mothers and young children with a variety of illnesses. Some of the unwanted children are cared for by the Bemm family until adopted or room is found in an orphanage. As a Christian he shares his faith and God's love with his patients. Broadway's Youth Lounge welcomes homeless and vulnerable youth to drop in weekly. The program builds on the church's reputation as an inclusive, welcoming place. The Lounge offers food, caring adults and safe space. As needs and issues come up, programs and components are added. From its very inception, the primary focus of the Youth Lounge has been steeped in the Gospel message of "Radical Hospitality" aimed primarily at disenfranchised LGBTQQ youth who migrate to the Lakeview neighborhood seeking acceptance and safety. Open on Saturdays with trained volunteers available to welcome and listen, the Youth Lounge continues to

welcome troubled and lonely youth who have been largely abandoned or hassled by others. The Christmas party was a highlight for youth and adults who enjoyed food, fellowship and the hope of the season.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES The new staff continues to transition into the new roles. Cindy Grissom and Vincent Wiggins are on the roll and ready to support our Youth Lounge. STEPS FOR EQUALITY

An excerpt from *Self-Made Man* by Norah Vincent (p.279, how hard it was to overcome):

...when I was being manly with men...the dialogue was ugly and as a woman in the middle of it I felt soiled and frightened just hearing it. I was shocked because at its worst it was so much worse than I thought it would be, so foreign and relentless were the obsessions with f--- and competing and hazing the weak guy. It was all there almost all the time and it made me think that many men are far worse than most women know, but also FAR BETTER, because I knew where so much of it was coming from and how hard it was to OVERCOME. I knew they were tied in a thousand knots and tapping out their distress in stilted code...As a guy you get about a three-note emotional range. That's it, at least as far as the outside world is concerned. Women get octaves, chromatic scales of tears, and joys and anxieties and despairs and erotic flamboyance, and now after black bra feminism, we even get vitriol, too. We get to be b-----, at least some of the time, and people write proud books about it. But guys get little more than bravado and rage. Forget doubt. Forget hurt. They take punches. They take care of business. And their intestines liquefy under the stress...Yes it's true guys get good stuff, too. Sometimes they still get a special respect and deference and a license to brag (at least in the work place). I wondered how they did it. Now I know. They did it because a TOUGH FRONT is all you have when there's nothing behind it but the weakness that you're not allowed to show. It's the biggest gift you get, compensation for...As if the culture were telling you, "We're going to cut our your heart, but we'll give you...a VIP pass to make up for it."

LAKEVIEW ACTION COALITION NEWS

Broadway is a member congregation of Lakeview Action Coalition (LAC); as such, we're invited to the conversation about the potential merger of LAC with Organization of the Northeast (ONE). The first public conversation took place at the last Community Council meeting (Susan Armstrong represented Broadway), and there will be other opportunities to be part of the discernment, if you are interested.

Both organizations are currently strong and vital, and the purpose of the merger would be to build a more powerful organization that could more effectively have an impact on social justice issues. LAC and ONE share advocacy efforts around similar issues -- housing, health care, economic justice, to name a few.

The decision making process will be inclusive and will run through the next several months (probably until March 2013). There will be several opportunities for input. HISTORICAL NOTE

Hear it for the ladies!

"Ladies' Aid Meeting" from *Church News*, February 1919

The Ladies' Aid meeting on February 6th was very well attended and the receipts from lunch were over \$9. The usual business was transacted, quilts tied and visiting done. Everybody was happy and why not, for we learned that from our entertainment and dinner we will realize the nice sum of \$100 or over, which is very gratifying to all after the hard work they went through to accomplish it. The traveling bag netted the neat sum of \$16.50.

Editor's notes: The Ladies' Aid Society was one of several women's church organization which were later merged into United Methodist Women. The dollar's purchasing power would have been in the range of 10-20% over that of today.
